

**COCKBURN-CAMPBELL, Lady Grace (née Spence)**

Lady Grace Cockburn-Campbell was the second wife of Sir Alexander Cockburn Campbell. They had three children Alexander, Thomas and Cecilia. Sir Alexander's first wife was Margaret Malcolm and there were two children by that marriage, Charlotte Isabella and Olympia. After Lady Grace had died in 1870, Sir Alexander married Sophie Trimmer of Albany, Western Australia on 4 April 1871 and died on 23 April 1871. He had been Resident Magistrate of Albany from 1861-1871. Lady Grace never came to Western Australia but remained in England.
