Mary Durack accumulated a vast collection of historical and biographical information in the course of her writing career. She gathered information including Northern identities and pioneers (H&B/NIP - 2 boxes), general subjects (H&B/SUBJ - 2 boxes), prominent Australians (H&B/OTH - 1 box), information relating to Argyle, Kimberleys, the Ord River area and the Ord River scheme (H&B/AKO - 2 boxes), information relating to the Aboriginals from the north of WA, NT and Queensland (H&B/ABS - 1 box) and Durack family (H&B/DUR – 2 boxes).

One often told tale of ‘Dad’ was – He went south for a holiday. One day he went by train somewhere. He eased himself sideways through the door of a railway carriage and sat down taking up a fair bit of seat. Two young girls were sitting opposite him was a case on a seat between them. One tapped out on the case in morse code something about Dad’s bulk. Her companion replied in kind. When they had finished, Dad leaned over and tapped out ‘Thank you’ on their case.

Appendix D

'Bilotcha' or 'Beloochie'

Story of white child (Bilotcha, or Biloochie) raised by Aboriginal people, discovered about 1889. (MDM note).

Story from old Aboriginal peoples, around Derby, of arrival of small boat – 3 men, a woman and a child. Men killed, mother died, child raised by 'Binghi' women. When he died in 1889, left 3 children.

Described by Harry Bostock of Lillawooloona Station as very large, fair complexion, reddish whiskers and moustache, bow-legged.

Arrested after killing of 2 stockmen and chines cook (Pidgeon?), Fitzroy River. Put in Derby gaol – seen that he was a white man, not half-caste – tribal makeup. Spoke with Aborigine. Very shy.

Escaped but arrested again

Died in Derby gaol about 1889.

Appendix E

Life of Ben Bridge

About 50 years ago, a young man, a noted colt breaker and one of the best buckjump riders of outback NSW, was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment for horse stealing. It was his 2nd or 3rd conviction, hence the heavy sentence. While he was doing his time in Murrundi Jail, one morning he was in the prison yard, working close to where some woman was washing her clothes, and hanging them on the line, he rushed to the line, grabbed the long clothes prop, put it alongst (?) the prison yard wall, climbed up the prop, got on top of the wall, pulled the clothes prop up and stood alongside the wall, on the outside slipped down the prop and off.

He and his young wife had a house on the outskirts of a small outback country township, there was a cellar "hide-out", in case he wanted to go in "smoke". So, he made for the hide-out as soon as he escaped. He stopped there in smoke until the hue and cry died down. Then he made out to the Gulf of Carpentaria, north Qld. He got a job on a cattle station called Riversleigh, on the O'Shannassy River, colt breaking.

Reports reached Burketown of a wonderful rider, working on Riversleigh. The Sargent (sic) of Police in Burketown got a description of him from a passer-by, which fitted with the escapee from Murrindundi Jail, NSW. So, Sgt McGrah rode up to Riversleigh Station early one morning. Ben, seeing the Police, hid himself in one of the station buildings. A man called Joe Blake was there. He was a Parson's son. The Sargent called upon him, in The Queen's name, to assist him to apprehend Ben. Joe said, "Call on me in the name of the twelve apostles, you B___d, and go to hell!". The Sargent threatened Joe with the law, Joe took no notice of him. Eventually, the Sargent arrested Ben. He, at the time, was suffering from an attack of malarial fever, which made him an easy victim for the Sargent.

Eventually the Sargent landed him in the lockup in Burketown - distant from Riversleigh 170 miles. The NSW Police Dept was notified, and a policeman was sent to identify him and escort him back to NSW. The NSW Police Officer arrived at Burketown, identified Ben and said they would start on the morrow by steamer, and said to Ben he hoped they would have a pleasant sea voyage together.

The lockup that Ben was in was just a weatherboard cell alongside the police station, also a weatherboard building, and in that tropical heat, dry and inflammable as timber. In the night, Ben set fire to his bed, his intention being to make the Sargent think the cell was on fire. He yelled out, "Fire! Fire!",

and by the time the Sargent arrived, the cell was on fire. The Sarg opened the cell door, Ben jumped at him, trying to pass him and go bush, but McGrah grabbed him, put a handcuff on one hand, and the cuff had a chain attached. The sargent was intending to chain him to a nearby fence when a man called Diamantina Harry ran up to the Sargent, yelling out to give him the prisoner, he will look after him, and telling the Sargent to save his wife and children. By this time, the whole Police Station was on fire. Diamantina Harry let Ben Bridge pull the chain out of his hand, and he yelled out, "The prisoner has escaped, he punched me on the jaw!". Ben ran towards the Albert River, an alligator infested river about 80 yards wide. A young policeman ran after Ben and caught up to him on the bank of the river. As the policeman overhauled Ben, Ben swung the chain and threatened to brain him if he put his hand on him. The policeman went back and told the Sargent Ben had jumped in the Albert River and was swimming across to the far side. A man ran up to the hotel, woke the NSW police officer and told him that Ben Bridge had escaped. The police officer asked how long it had been since Ben got away, and the man replied about half an hour. The NSW police officer said, "Good night. I am going back to bed. Put Ben at the North Pole, and in less than half an hour he will have a horse, saddle and bridle".

The next place Ben was located by the police was on a large sheep station on the Flinders River, where he was colt breaking. Again, he was located by his splendid horsemanship, which was remarkable, because every man in north Qld was a good horseman. Two police raided the homestead. They were sure Ben was somewhere about the station, which they started to search. A woman cooks on the station said to Ben, "Get in my bedroom", and she locked the door. On the police coming to search the room, she said, "This is my bedroom, surely you do not want to search a woman's bedroom". The policemen, noticing the hostile looks of the station men, hastily said, "Oh no, it is locked, he cannot be in there". The law of the far outback is: - no woman can be insulted with impunity.

Ben made a beeline for the NT, that land of open spaces, unfenced, 80 to 100 miles between neighbours, where every man was under an assumed name, and 8 out of every 10 men stockkeeping on the cattle stations were wanted by the police in either NSW or Qld for horse or cattle-stealing

I wish to state right now that bags of sovereigns could be left lying about and not one sovereign would be taken, the only thing they could not pass was horses and cleanskins (viz unbranded cattle). Although these men had a bad name yet, the outback of north Qld and NT and East and North Kimberley were opened up, waterholes, springs etc were found by them, some of the well-known roads in NT and East Kimberley were found by these so-called horse and cattle thieves. Explorers all, they are all dead. No one has told the world of their exploits.

Sleep on, old mates of mine, I hope soon to meet you. We will tell over the poddy dodging exploits. Of the years the locusts have ate.

Ben made it to the NT, keeping around Cloncurry and other small towns where police would be met. He met men who through the 'Bush Freemasonry', knew he was on 'the dodge'. They offered their services to pilot him by back track only known to few. They passed him on to others who piloted him further out towards the NT border. They did not do it for gain, only following out the bush "golden rule" - "Do to others as you would like to be done by".

Eventually, he reached that last outpost of northern Qld, the town of Camooweal, 12 miles from the NT border. Here he met his brother and his wife and 3 young children, travelling out to the Kimberley, WA. He had made a tilt for his waggon, and in the 'covered waggon' his wife and children lived and rode, except one, the eldest a girl, Mabel, who drove along the spare horses and a cow for milk.

The town of Camooweal was en fete. The annual race meeting was to be held (Ben rode in some of the races. Rode 2 or 3 winners.). All the cattle men, fencers, yard builders, was in camped on the Georgina River, and on Lake Kenellan (a large waterhole in the Georgina River about 2 miles below the town). The town comprised, in those days (about 50 years ago), 2 pubs, 2 stores and a police station. Ben Bridge camped out in the timber out from 'Lake Kenellan'. Joe Bridge was camped on the lake. They both decided to wait and see the races, which they done.

Joe Bridge met the manager of Avon Downs, a station in the NT, 50 miles west of Camooweal. He gave Joe a contract to cut and cart about 200 cord and 4-foot gidgea (??) logs, to be carted to bores on the station, to be used in the engines when in the dry weather, the cattle would be on the bores, for water. So, Joe, putting about 2 ton of rations, flour tea, sugar, salt, rice, dried fruit, etc, on his waggon, drove out to Avon Downs Station, then 20 miles out to a large patch of gidgea, where he formed a camp. He took the tarpaulin cover off his waggon and started to cut and cart the firewood. His brother Ben stopped for a bit with Joe and helped him with his contract.

Later on, he left his brother and went on to Brunette Downs, where under the name of MacDonald, he took up a job of stock keeping. He left his packs out from the homestead in case of an emergency - he could get his horses out of the big horse paddock and off. One day, a policeman rode up to the station and told the manager that he was after a man called Ben Bridge, who had escaped from Murrundi Jail. The manager said, "McDonald, you muster the horses in the big paddock". Of course, Ben took "the office", got his horses, put the packs on and off. The managers of them outback NT and WA cattle stations detested a police officer poking his nose about the station looking for wanted men. In fact, most of the men stock-keeping were in that category. They were all good cattle men and top-notch riders, men hard to get in that outback country.

Anyway Ben went, hitting the Overland telegraph line at Newcastle Waters Cattle Station. Then across the Murrinji Track, where he hit the head of the Armstrong River and followed it down to the Victoria River. He kept on west until he left the NT and crossed into WA. He asked for work at the Ord River Station, told the manager he was a poor horseman (his splendid horsemanship used to put the police on his tail). The Ord River manager was very short of men, so he put Ben on, promising him quiet horses to ride. Ben was about 3 months in the mustering camp, doing the "John Gilpin" act. He was the butt of the stockmen and blackboys working in the mustering camp, on account of his bad horsemanship.

One afternoon, they rode out about 15 miles, from the main camp, camped out that night intending to muster the cattle next morning back towards camp, where around dinner time, they would put them on a drafting camp, then draft out the cows and calves, drive them to the branding yard and yard them up. Early the next morning they would draft and brand up the calves.

Ben rode in some of the races. Rode 2 or 3 winners.

In the morning they caught their horses, one of the black boys was given a buckjumper to ride. The horse pelted the black boy. The men caught the horse and the boy got on it only to be thrown again. The men said it was no use putting the black boy on again, he will only be thrown, and the head stockman said, "None of us is man enough for him". They were in a quandary. Ben Bridge said,

"I will ride him",

"You!", they said, "He will pelt you the height of a country cabin" (a bush expression). Ben took the boy's saddle off the buckjumper, put his own on, asked one of the stockmen for the loan of his spurs, which he put on and jumped on the buckjumper. Like a tradesman he was, landing in the saddle, he put both spurs in the horse. The horse got to it in style. Ben sitting him like a centaur, rode the buckjumper to a standstill. The stockmen and black boys looked on in amazement. They said it was the finest exhibition of riding they had ever seen. Ben said, "For Christ's sake, do not mention it, or else the police will be on my track again!".

Sure enough, it was again his undoing. Black boys tell boys of adjoining stations when they meet to muster cattle, and surrounding stations send a white stockman and 2 black stock boys to get their stray cattle and bring them home. An exploit like Ben kidding them that he was a poor horseman and then "coming out of his shell" and riding an outlaw. The tale was told, and lost nothing in the telling, that about 3 months later, Sarg Brophy of the Halls Creek goldfields arrived at the Ord River Station to apprehend Ben.

The mustering outfit was camped on the Negri River. Old Sam Muggleton, head stockman in charge, as Sarg Brophy rode up to the camp, he was recognised, and Bridge jumped into the Negri River. Brophy ran after him. Sam yelled out, "He ran up the river, Brophy!", so off Brophy went up the river, but Ben had gone down.

By Ben following the Negri down for about 20 miles, he came to where its junctions in the Ord, right at the foot of the Osborne Ranges. The ranges have an area of about 20 miles east and west and about the same north and south. 400 square miles, 256 000 acres of unoccupied country full of springs. Very rough mountainous country. Ben holed up in the Osborne Ranges. His horses and packs were worked to him, and he was supplied with food and information, it being brought to him by a black boy, Major by name. Major was working on a cattle station called Texas. The station was situated on the banks of the Ord River, right at the foot of the Osborne Ranges.

(Major, 25 years later, was outlawed and lived in the same ranges, he and 2 other boys that had joined him was shot in the vicinity of where Ben was in "Smoke". They shot 3 men before they themselves were shot.)

When the hue and cry died down, Ben worked across the border into the NT. Sometimes he would join some men getting cleanskin cattle. His brother, Joe, arrived in the Kimberley about 1895, and he took up a pastoral lease on the road between Wyndham and the Halls Creek goldfields. He built a homestead on a spring called Cartridge, left his wife and children there, he himself carting with his waggon and horses, loading form Wyndham to Halls Creek

goldfields. Ben had acquired about 100 head of cleanskins (unbranded cattle), he drove them over to his brother Joe and let them go on Joe's country, first putting Joe's registered brand on them. Joe's two eldest children, Mabel, and Bertie, rode around the cattle when Joe was on the road with his team. When he turned his team horses out to spell for the first wet season, he, with 3 black boys and another white man, would go through the hills to the outskirts of the Ord River Station, run and make a raid and bring back 50 or 60 head of cleanskin heifers or mickies. Thus, by hard riding and overstrained honesty, he in time acquired a fair herd, and a name of being a poddy dodger.

Some of the chaps was chucking off to a police constable stationed at Wild Dog Spring, close to the NT/WA border. The constable's name was Freeman. So, he, taking two black trackers with him (he is having taken an oath "over a bag of bibles" that he would arrest Ben), scouted around the NT side of the border, picked up Ben's track's (Ben had gotten careless, as the police had ceased from bothering him), his trackers following his horse tracks. Ben soon knew that the policeman was on his tracks, so leaving his packs at a camp he passed, and riding the best of his horses, carrying a blanket and some food in front of his saddle, he tried to shake the policeman off. But Freeman was after the Sargent's stripes, which would be his if he caught Ben. He followed Ben's tracks across the Ord River, then up the Bow River to Mount Pitt, where 2 men, Louis Degenhardt and Walter Long, were building a branding yard for Lissadell Station. From here, Ben turned north and followed the Denham Ranges, hit the head of Cabbage Tree Creek and followed it down to the Denham River. Ben rode his horse down the bank of the river. He tied his horse up and crossed the water at a shallow place. He walked up the bank on the opposite side and early in the morning, walked into the kitchen of the Denham station and asked for Bob Beattie, the cook, for a feed. Bob put a feed on the table. Ben sat in and was enjoying a good breakfast when Bill Freeman walked in the kitchen, and with his revolver pointed at Ben, told him to put his hands up.

Freeman and his two trackers had tracked Ben to the bed of the Denham River and there saw Ben's horse tied to a tree. Freeman put one of his trackers to watch the saddle horse, and he told the tracker to shoot the horse if Ben ran to get on the horse. And so, Ben was caught at last. His sentence had expired by the time he was landed back in NSW.

The Kimberley men signed a petition - a stockman in the Kimberley, Sir Alexander Theodore Cockburn-Campbell Bart, headed the petition with an imposing signature. The petition read that Ben, during the years he lived in the Kimberley, led an honest life, so the NSW authorities, after a few months in jail, discharged him and told him to sin no more.

So, some time later, he could not resist stealing some good horses, and in he went again.

Dear Sir,

I am in receipt of advice from Ord River Station, dated the 19th of February last.

Therein the Manager informs me that he has petitioned you to afford the Ord or Negri Police protection by establishing a Police Station on the Negri River. Being in a central position, and as McDuff, the Stock Inspector, has posted a notice that the Ord is to be a crossing place for stock passing into Western Australia, considers it would be a desirable place.

As it is rumoured that the Government intend removing one of the Police Stations on the Gold Fields Road to Wyndham, he states that he has suggested to you the suitability of the above site for a camp, especially as protection is now so much needed.

One of the men writing states that there has been a Native police assistant murdered at Durack's, and that if something is not done and that shortly there will be more of it on the Ord.

The Manager also states that he has sent to Halls Creek for Police protection, but that none have arrived. In fact, our property is entirely at the mercy of the Blacks.

The distance of a Police camp is, on the Halls Creek side, 130 miles, and on the Wyndham side, 210 miles. The whole station might be looted and all hands murdered and the Blacks miles away before the Police would know anything of the matter.

The Kimberley settlers certainly have had but scant recognition of the matter of either protection or assistance by the Government in any way, and I attribute to the half-hearted way the Government have doled out the little protection they have afforded, the murders that were committed at Derby, at Osmond Ranges, at Duracks, and evidently before long will be in a position to add to (that list) the Ord.

The brutality of killing cows calving and being heavy with calf is cause alone sufficient to make a government move, even if in the duty of preventing cruelty to animals, if it did not care about its settlers. It seems unlike a civilised authority to let such cruel outrages go on without making the slightest attempt to put a stop to it. And are men's lives of no concern to the Government because they live in Kimberley?

I am told by the Captain of the Taglifero that nearly all of the cattle shipped last year were either marked or maimed in some way by spear wounds, yet nothing is done by the authorities to improve this brutish state of things.

I am of opinion that a couple of Police Constables stationed at the Negri could effectually (sic) patrol the whole of the cattle stations between Halls Creek and Wyndham and could have the cattle crossing and also the overlanders coming into Halls Creek under surveillance. Such an arrangement, provided they are not prevented from acting promptly by restrictions from Perth, would in a few months alter things entirely, and the Kimberley would be among the

settled districts where life and property would be safe (which is not the case now), and complaints would cease. As it is now it will never be anything but what it has been for the last eleven years, the reverse of creditable to the Government.

What encouragement is there held out to settlers to bring or introduce into the country any good or high-class animals when we have the example of Duracks (he means what happened to the Durack's cattle etc) before us. (The blacks) killing the stud cattle and spearing the Police assistant (with three Police Constables at Wyndham, within forty miles) and nothing done by the authorities to either chastise or capture the murderers, what can be expected? And this in a British governed colony. I have endeavoured to improve the Ord cattle by sending over some high-class animals, but if they share the fate of Duracks, it will be the last I will send.

It would be generally supposed that a government would render every assistance in its power to improve and encourage its settlers in the importation of superior stock in the territory under its jurisdiction, but such is not at present the case in Western Australia. All is left at the mercy of a horde of brutal savages, and good stock like the cows, being quiet, would surely suffer first.

I think you will admit that we have just cause of complaint, and very just, considering the scant justice we have received at the hands of the Government and the amount of rents paid and other expenditure over the last thirteen for the Kimberley, whereas very little for the improvement of the law and order established there, murder and cattle spearing going on now worse than it was ten years ago, and the money expended on Police is certainly, as far as the Kimberley is concerned, not justified by results. In round figures, for the last twelve years, the Government has been paid 860 pounds pa, and there has been expended from 1500 to 2000 pounds in wages, stores etc. The capital investment is close on 80 000 pounds, the losses in cattle speared by the Blacks is about 28 000 pounds, and now, after eleven years of this sort of thing, a daily brutal killing of cows calving and heavy with calf still goes on. I think the Government must admit that this is not the treatment English settlers expect (after having risked their capital) from the Government of a British colony. We have obeyed the laws, we have fulfilled all obligations to the Crown, and we want what everyone under English rule is entitled to, protection for our lives and property from the officers entrusted with the Government of the colony, and the safety of those under its charge and within its jurisdiction.

We are not allowed to defend our own property, we have to obey the law, but the savage is let loose upon us, we have to stand quietly by and all this slaughtering in its brutal form goes on and on without the slightest attempt by the Government to remedy it. Complaints are rife all around. Will the Government act before more murders are committed? Or do they require the Derby Affair transacted again first? The cannot say they are not warned in time as the newspapers are showing them what is coming.

The Premier was interviewed some time about November last by Messrs Durack, who was then in Perth, and Mr Frank Connor MLA, Parliamentary Representative for West Kimberley, respectively, about complaints then made by Kimberley settlers of wholesale cattle slaughtering that was going on at that time. Promises were made that the Police should put a stop to it and there it ended. Things now are worse than then.

I now trust that you will see your way to advise the Government to establish a small camp at the Negri. I am sure such a step is quite warranted both by the present serious state of affairs, and the ultimate benefit of all persons settled there. It would be required at the crossing, for Government purposes, and well I feel assured there is a few months to disestablish the reign of lawlessness and fear now existing in the Kimberley District, to say nothing of the brutality. I therefore hope you will see your way to grant this request.

Appendix H

History of Thomas MacNAMARA by Paddy MacNamara

(Undated, probably 1940s)

NB: Where possible, original spelling and grammar are as by Paddy MacNamara. (Long-time manager of Lissadel Station.)

Thomas MacNAMARA's history as far as I can remember it.

My grandfather came to Aus from Eirland and took up country on the Murrumbidgee, and called the place 'Waylong', where he reared a big family. My mother's father also had a place not fare away, called 'Toalsbruk', and there were many other small settlers around about and some large ones. The cattle and horses soon got out of hand in the Nally scrubs. They called those small settlers in those days Cockeys.

On my grandfather's place, they had sheep and cattle. They had to shepherd the sheep owing to wild dogs. One of my father's jobs was to take the weekly rations to the shepherds, 10 lbs of meat, 8 flour, 2 lbs sugar, 1/4 lb tea (8, 10, 2 and 1/4). One shepherd, a halfcast, showed my father a nugget of gold and asked him if it was any good. Father tried to get him to show him where he found it, but the old chap would not do so, he left and went away. Years after that was where Waylong gold rush broke out years after and where the town of Waylong is today.

My father got itchy feet and left home and followed the butchering business and managed a large sheep station for Wontan Brothers(?). He had been out to Queensland before this with an uncle. He went out to a station, Bingera, for a mob of store bullocks. He eventually decided to try his luck in Queensland. He started off with a buggy and 16 horses, mother driving the buggy and he is driving the spare horses. They had 3 small children plus Lily and Kate, she is being a baby. They came to a small town on the Paroo River, called Eulo. There, 2 brothers, Jim and Charley MURDITH, they had a butchering business, and father bought them out. The Eulo Queen, as she was called, head a hotel and a butcher's shop. After father got going, she had to close the shop up as no one would buy meat off her. The Eulo Queen's name was Mrs Wick ROBINSON. My father was also Pound keeper, Justas of the piece, Judge at the local races and many other things.

I was born in Eulo 30th April 1888, the year of the big comet. During our stay in Eulo, we put together about 700 cattle. Mother milked about 30 cows, made butter, and sold it for 2/ per pound. Father sold the butchering business, took up a block 12 miles above Eulo on the Paroo and called it Bingala. Only stayed here 2 years, he did not like it. Took up another place on Bough Creek, 3 miles out of Eulo, on the Eulo Bunnamulla Road, and he called this place Camerou. We used to brand up during the wet and go droving during the droving season, then brand up after the droving season was finished. As a matter of fact, we never let our brands get cold. When we were not droving cattle, was buying up. You could get fat bullocks for 2 pounds per head and spayed cows for 1/10/- those times. You could ride all day and never get out of cattle and weld horses. Jimmy TYSON owned the country from Burracun, on the NSW and Qld border, to Eulo. He had quite a few stations on the Warrago River, Tinnanbura being the largest. There was supposed to be one hundred thousand (100,000) cleanskins on Tinnanbura, they were everywhere.

After a few years, Father got itchy feet again, sold the place unstocked and took up a place about 100 miles away, called it Cocklarina, and formed another station. We had at this time 6000 cattle. We took them up in 2 mobs, camped and traveld them in 2 mobs, I mean, we took 3000 first and then came back and took the other 3000. The year before the big drought that lasted 6 years, my father bought 5000 maiden ewes. My father was a first-class sheep and cattle man and had the right idea of breeding good stock horses, when this big drought sits in. We had 17000 cattle, 600 beautiful horses, 7000 sheep, and when it was over, only had 16 horses, 350 cattle and 1100 sheep and owed a lot of money. The company we were mortgaged to took everything with the except of a 100 fat sheep that was not earmarked, and the sisters claimed 1 cow with a young calf and 6 unbroken horses they did not find.

After a few years, went out to Thargomindah. We had 600 sheep, 20 horses and about 30 cows. We battled about Thargomindah for a few years, then took up an old station that had been thrown up by (a man) named Chusint(?). In 1913, we sold the place and sheep 5000, to KIDMAN. Kidman wanted us out of it because this Chusint was in the middle of his big cattle stations.

We left Thargomindah in Oct 1913. At this time, my 2 eldest sisters were married. The eldest Mrs McMahon is staying with me here. She is Frank McMahon's mother, and he has been managing Cresswell Downs, McArthur River and Tanembrinie, in the Territory since '95. You must remember him. This year, we left Thargomindah, we had 800 cattle, 115 horses and it was a very dry year. We were making for Eva Downs on the Barkly Tableland; it was an old, deserted station. I might mention here, we were the first people to take sheep into the Thargomindah District, and Thargomindah was the second place in Qld to be lit up by electricity. They got the power from an artesian bore. To get back onto this trip from Thargo, we had a bullock wagon, a dray and a buggy. As I say, it was a very dry year and water was very scarce. We did one 70 miles without water for the cattle or cows, and we never did the 70 miles without water, but did 35. The cattle were very poor and tired. It is a little secret how we got over that 70-mile dry stage. It was on a big sheep station, Waherean. About halfway over this dry stage, there was plenty water 6 miles off the stock route. We were 2 years going from Thargomindah to Mackinlay, first our cattle got pleuro, so we were quarantined for 3 months near a small town called Kynuna. We started off again, one week on the roads and the cattle got red water, so we got quarantined again, near McKinlay. We decided to go no further, so took up Mt Tracey on the head of the Cloncurry River.

My brother Louis, still owns it. This is not far from Squirrell, 4 miles from where my father got hurt and the plane picked him up at Black Eye and took him to Winton Hospital. He died years after in Griffith, NSW, at the age of 95.

My young sister still owns Squirrell Hills. She had 11 children, her husband died at 50 and she carried on well with the place. We traded under the name of MacNamara & Sons, and I was appointed manager when I was quite young. But my brother Louis and I could not git on after many years of dysfunction and unpleasantness, so I walked out and left it to the Owen and Louis. This is most of my Father's life as far as I can remember it. Please excuse pencil.
