

RUSSELL, ENID, 1904-1958

In 1930 Enid Russell became the first female graduate of the University of Western Australia Law School. She was admitted as a legal practitioner in 1931, the first Western Australian woman admitted to legal practice in Western Australia. She was also a part-time lecturer at the UWA Law School from 1946 to 1951.

C1951, Enid wrote *A history of the development of the legal system in Western Australia*. After Enid's death in 1958, the manuscript was edited and completed in 1979 by F.M. Robinson and P.W. Nichols and published in 1980 as *A history of the law in Western Australia and its development from 1829 to 1979*.
